III-B. Sequence


Sequence is the order in which things happen. Just as a story has a beginning, a middle, and an end, passages have details that are presented in a certain order. This order becomes most important when attempting to do something like making cookies. If you do not follow the directions in the exact order that they are given, the cookies will not turn out properly. There are special words that let you know the order in which things happen. These are called **key words**. Here are some examples of key words:

first, second, third, after, before, last, then, finally, now, next, later, following, at the end

Place the following things in the correct order by placing a number 1 next to the first step, then 2 next to the second step, until you get to number 6.


